She teaches directing, playwriting and acting and has directed more than 30 plays during her tenure at MTSU. Deborah developed the "Playworks" series at MTSU which produces new student plays annually. She also developed the Lynn Brown Children's Theatre Company in 1982 which produces new plays for children. She works professionally as an actor and director throughout the southeast and has conducted adjudication workshops at the Southeastern Theatre Conference, Tennessee Theatre Association, Catholic University of Washington D.C., and the Florida Theatre Conference. She is the chair of KC/ACTF Region IV and will be hosting the KC/ACTF Regional festival at MTSU Feb. 5-9. Deborah is very proud of her three children, Lucas, Susan, and Ian, and enjoys watching them play many soccer, baseball and basketball games.

Philip Atlakson wrote, directed, and produced the feature film Not This Part of the World, co-wrote The Basketball Diaries with director Michael Hoffman for Robert Redford's Wildwood Productions (unproduced), and served as writing consultant on Hoffman's Soapdish for Paramount Pictures. His plays are primarily written for production by DOWNhouse Theatre which he founded in 1989. But they have also been presented Off Broadway, Off Off Broadway, and at universities and regional theatres around the country. He has served as Playwriting Awards Committee Chair for Region VII of the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival. He is the recipient of the Stanley Drama Prize, the KC/ACTF Gold Medallion Award, the Idaho Commission on the Arts Fellowship for Playwriting, the Nell Shipman Award for Filmmaking Excellence, and the Long Island Film Festival's Best First Feature Film Award. He heads the Dramatic Writing Program at Boise State University.

Marcella Beckwith, a member of United Scenic Artists 829, is a free-lance costume and scenery designer who is also involved with several educational projects. She holds an M.F.A. from Northwestern University and B.S. in Music with a concentration in Design from Indiana University. Previously, she spent six years as a resident scenographer for the Fundacao Clovis Salgado Performing Arts Center as well as designing and producing for some of the major theatres and opera houses in Brazil. She has also taught design and production at the University of Northern Iowa and the University of South Florida. She particularly enjoys working with new works, dance theatre, and works that include movement, music, voice and text. Her current area of research is Magic Realism.

Scott Bradley designed the world premier of August Wilson's *Seven Guitars* at the Goodman Theatre. He received a Drama Desk Award for Set Design and a Tony Award

nomination for the Broadway production, as well as the Outer Critics' Circle Award for Best Design Collaboration. He was nominated by the Drama Desk Award committee for his Broadway set design of Wilson's Joe Turner's Come and Gone. Scott designed the set for Steve Martin's Picasso at the Lapin Agile Off Broadway at the Promenade Theatre. Other Off Broadway credits include work at Second Stage Theater, Provincetown Playhouse, Jewish Repertory Theater, South Street Theater and the New Federal Theatre. Regional work includes work at the Goodman Theatre, the Huntington Theatre, Indiana Repertory Theatre, Steppenwolf, American Repertory Theatre, Portland Stage Company and the Alliance Theatre. He has collaborated with Mary Zimmerman on her adaptation of The Notebooks of Leonardo da Vinci which received the Jeff nomination for best set design at the Goodman Theater and was subsequently chosen for the Lincoln Center's Serious Fun! Festival. Scott also designed the background cityscape for "Late Night With David Letterman." Scott has a B.F.A. from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and the M.F.A. from Yale School of Drama. In his spare time, he serves as the head of the scene design program at Boston University.

Risa Brainin is a freelance director in the Twin Cities who has a long assocation with the Guthrie Theatre. She has taught acting in the Guthrie's outreach program for eight years, served as Resident Director, Associate Company Director, assisted directed many productions and directed A Christmas Carol, The Merchant of Venice, Short Plays: Tone Clusters, Naomi in the Living Room, Zoo Story and most recently Mystery of the Rose Bouquet. In addition, she directed Civil Ceremony at The Great American History Theatre, The Cover of Life at The Cricket, Christopher's Shirt at the Illusion, Brave is Mahng Is Loon and Mindworks Onstage for SteppingStone Theatre, and At Sea, Final Placement and Down by the Pond at The Actor's Theatre of Louisville. She codirected A...My Name is Still Alice at Mixed Blood and Women: Scenes from Life at The Collaborative Theatre. A graduate of Carnegie-Mellon University Drama Program, Ms. Brainin teaches acting privately and at the University of Minnesota M.F.A. program where she is currently directing Three Sisters.

Robert Byrnes has been University Carillonneur at the University of Northern Iowa since 1972. He received his B.A. and M.A. degrees from UNI and studied carillon with Dr. Richard von Grabow at Iowa State University as part of his graduate work. Byrnes has performed carillon recitals in Iowa, Illinois, Minnesota, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Maryland, Michigan, Washington D.C., Texas, Indiana, California and Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. In September 1978, he was one of the four finalists in the First National Carillon Playing Competition, held in Springfield, Illinois. A "Carilloneur" member of the Guild of Carilloneurs in North America, Byrnes was a member of the Board of Directors for six years and was treasurer for five years with that organization.

Roy Close is a playwright and critic based in Minneapolis. A graduate of the University of Minnesota, he spent two decades as a critic and editor for the "Minneapolis Star" (1971-80) and "Saint Paul Pioneer Press" (1981-92), where he covered theater, classical music and dance. Since his retirement from daily journalism, he has written Critical Conditions (1994), a book-length study of criticism in Minnesota; two full-length plays, *The Lincoln Lecture* and *Lies*, *Lies* (produced in 1996 by Dudley Riggs's Brave New Workshop); four one-act plays; and a variety of articles for "Mpls.St.Paul" magazine and other publications. He also serves as editor of "Minnesota Common Ground," an award-winning journal of landscape architecture.

Carol Colburn is an Associate Professor of Theatre/ Costume Design at the University of Northern Iowa. She holds a B.A. in Theatre from Western Washington University and an M.A. and Ph.D. in Design and Art History/ Museology from the University of Minnesota.

Elizabeth Craven has been working in the theater continuously since 1973. She recently relocated to Knoxville, Tennessee, after practicing theater in the San Francisco Bay Area, where she directed professionally and served as Artistic Director of the critically-acclaimed Western Union Theater Company from 1984 to 1994. She is the recipient of the North Bay Critics' Award for Best Director and Best Small Company. Elizabeth is also a veteran teacher of acting and directing and has held positions on the faculties of Sonoma State University in California and The University of Tennessee, Knoxville. She is currently the Director of The International Actor Training Program (M.F.A.) at the University of Tennessee and Associate Artistic Director of the Clarence Brown Theater Company, a twenty-five year old LORT Theater. She has directed over sixty plays in the United States and abroad. She was a student of The Polish Laboratory Theater in the 1970s and a close colleague of the late Zbigniew Cynkutis. She will be directing professional productions in both Hungary and Germany within the coming year. She has just completed work on Pinocchio 2035, a new play with New York solo performer, Randall Jaynes, which premiered at Moscow invitational Solo Performance Festival in October and will be seen Off Broadway at PS 122 this coming year. Her 1987 production of Strider and her 1996 production of God's Country were both performed at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., as national winners in the American College Theater Festival.

Leonard Curtis has worked as a guest artist at Coe College, Cornell College, Grinnell College and the University of Iowa. His professional credits include scenic artist appointments at Missouri Repertory Theatre in Kansas City and New American Theatre in Rockford, Illinois. He is currently serving as Assistant Professor of Design and Production Manager at Theatre UNI. He received his B.A. in Art History and M.F.A. in Theatre Arts from the Univerity of Iowa.

Roxann Dawson -Although most people know Roxann Dawson as B'Ellana Torres in *Star Trek: Voyager*, she manages

to combine professional careers in both acting and writing. As an actress she has starred on Broadway, Off Broadway, regional theatre, film and television. Her first professional job was that of Morales in A Chorus Line on Broadway. She also starred in New York's Circle Repertory Company and the Classic Stage Company. Regionally she has appeared at the American Contemporary Theatre and at the Arena Stage. Her recent film credits include Darkman III and Guilty By Suspicion with Robert De Niro. Her television credits include series regular roles on Nightingales, The Round Table, and guest starring roles in Equal Justice, Matlock, The Untouchables, and Jack's Place. Her television movies credits include Mortal Sins, Dirty Work, Broken Angel, and Pointman. In addition to writing the play Passage Through the Heart, which just received its world premiere at the University of Minnesota-Duluth, she recently signed a trilogy book deal with Simon and Schuster. Her first novel, "Entering Tenebrea," will be released in hard back this January. In her spare time Roxann works with Camp Heartland, a camp for children with AIDS.

Walter de Oliveira is the coordinator of the Youth and Human Services Division of the School of H.P.E.L.S. at the University of Northern Iowa. He has been working with the Theatre of the Opressed system for the past fifteen years and more recently with a reconceptualization of that system: Theatre of Liberation. He founded and directs the Center for Theater of Liberation at UNI.

Marcia Douglas is a director, actor, educator, and performer. She joined the faculty of Southwest Missouri State University in 1993 and teaches acting, improvisation, and movement for actors. She has an M.A. in Directing from the University of Washington and an M.F.A. in Acting from Southern Methodist University. In addition to directing, choreographing, and acting in many productions, she has also taught workshops and performed her improvisational one woman show nationally and internationally.

Jay Edelnant is Professor of Theatre at the University of Northern Iowa. He teaches courses in theatre research, directing, and dramatic theory, directs and writes plays, and has served as Director of Theatre and director of the graduate program. He has served as a consultant for various national, and international educational and arts agencies and received the Regents Award for Faculty Excellence. His most recent published research focused on the rhetoric of fictionist and dramatist Vladimir Nabokov, the national secondary school curricula in theatre, and curricular goals in critical thinking for children utilizing drama. Recent production work includes Tony Kushner's A Dybbuk, David Ives's All In The Timing, Stephen Sondheim's Assassins, Frank McGuiness's Someone Who'll Watch Over Me, and guest artist residencies in Illinois, Iowa, Arkansas, and Nebraska. He serves as a consultant and evaluator for other universities, to the Iowa Arts Council, Humanities Board, Department of Education and was a consultant to the Ostrovsky Theatrical and Art Institute of Tashkent in Uzbekistan, U.S.S.R. He was one of the founding editors and serves as Consulting Editor to the Association for Theatre in Higher Education's national State University, and the American Indian Lawyers Training Program at Hastings Law School in San Francisco, with degrees in both Indian Law and Communications. He is currently holding the position of consultant for the David T. Vernon Indian Arts Musuem.

Gregg Henry has directed and/or staged the fights for the Wisconsin, Oklahoma and Iowa Shakespeare Festivals, and was a member of the acting company of the Colorado Shakespeare Festival for two seasons. As an actor, recent performances include Martin Dysart in Equus with his students at Iowa State University, and Michael in the University of Northern Iowa Summer Repertory production of Someone Who'll Watch Over Me directed by Jay Edelnant. Last summer he directed *The Comedy of Errors* for Michigan's Jackson Shakespeare Festival and staged the fights for the Des Moines Metro Opera production of Verdi's Macbeth. He recently completed an observership at the Repertory Theatre of St. Louis on their production of Galileo, and directed Hamlet at Iowa State University where he is an Associate Professor and the Director of Theatre. Gregg holds an M.F.A. from the University of Michigan and serves as the Vice Chair of Region V of the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival.

John W. Holman is a scenic and lighting designer and the director of the design and technical area at Drake University in Des Moines. He received his M.F.A. in Design and Technical Theatre from the University of Utah in 1986. John has designed scenery and/or lighting for twenty-four productions in his six years at Drake. The last four years have been devoted to exploring the use of the computer as a design/conceptualization tool and to finding ways to incorporate interactive course materials into his classroom.

Melanie Hughes-Holcomb received her B.F.A. in Stage Management from California Institute of the Arts in 1990. Before, during and after that time she used her skills in a variety of performing arts settings. These include summer stock, Rep, dinner theatre, modern & ballet dance, film and opera. She enjoys the ability to work with so many different art forms. The majority of her work has been with touring companies or companies that tour, serving as Stage Manager, Road Manager or Company Manager. Some more recent examples are: Hartford Ballet, Nebraska Theatre Caravan, Ballet Omaha and the Nebraska Shakespeare Festival. She has finally let personal life win out over the professional, and is working as an administrator in the Theatre Arts Department at the University of Iowa while she contemplates a career change.

Paul J. Hustoles is currently Professor and Chair of the Department of Theatre Arts at Mankato State University, Minnesota, where he has also been Artistic Director of Highland Summer Theatre since 1985. Paul received his B.F.A. from Wayne State University, his MA from the University of Michigan and his Ph.D. from Texas Tech University. A college instructor for over twenty-two years, he has taught in Missouri, Texas, Mississippi and Michigan. His specialties include acting, directing, musical theatre,

theatre management and theatre history. He practices what he preaches, having directed over 125 shows (currently working on Cyrano de Bergerac and Phantom) and having produced over 325. He was Artistic Director of the late, great Mule Barn Theatre, Missouri, for six years, and will celebrate his 26th consecutive year of summer stock in 1997. At Mankato State he was Speaker of the Faculty Senate when he became Acting Vice President for University Advancement and Secretary of the MSU Foundation Board, serving in those positions for 15 months. He is listed in "Who's Who in America" (and "Who's Who in Entertainment" and "Who's Who in Education"). Paul is a past Vice Chair of Region V North of the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival and immediate past Vice Chair of Region V. He served on the National Committee as the "Chair of Chairs" and is the current Chair of Region V.

Michael Kachingwe - After returning to the Steppenwolf stage for Everyman, directed by Tony Award winner Frank Galati, Michale Kachingwe appeared in the tour of Crossroads Theatre production of Nomathemba, featuring Ladysmith Black Mambazo, which was performed at the Kennedy Center for five weeks. He was also a member of the 1996 Lessac Summer Workshop at Ball State University. He returned to Northern Illinois University to direct Arms and the Man, and served as movement and vocal consultant for the Capital Rep production of Dancing at Lughnasa. Mr. Kachingwe has also taught voice and movement workshops at Booker T. Washington Performing Arts High School in Dallas, Texas. He currently is the Head of the B.F.A. Acting Program at Northern Illinois University.

Wendy Knox is Artistic Director of Frank Theatre, and an Artistic Associate of the Nautilus Music-Theatre Ensemble in Minneapolis. Her work with Frank Theatre includes Suzan-Lori Parks's *The America Play*, Shakespeare's *Measure for Measure*, Sophie Treadwell's *Machinal*, several Caryl Churchill works (*Top Girls* and *Mad Forest*), the English language premiere of Maaria Koskiluoma's *Tottering House*, and an original adaptation of Heiner Muller's *Description of a Picture*, *Explosion of a Memory*. She recently received an Intermedia Arts Diverse Visions grant, and her second Jerome Travel and Study grant, to develop a work based on the life of Mata Hari. She is a past recipient of a Minnesota State Arts Board fellowship and a Fulbright scholarship.

Jeff Koep is Dean of the College of Fine and Performing Arts at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. Previous to the appointment he served as Professor and Chair of Theatre at UNLV. Dr. Koep is also National Chair of the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival, an organization with which he has been associated for 20 years. His free time from these demanding positions allows him to serve as the Chair of the Society of American Fight Directors' Board; Artistic Advisor/First Vice-President of the Carolina Playwrights Center which offered the first workshop presentation of Love, Valor, and Compassion for Terrance McNally; Director of the National Senior Adult Theatre Institute; and, a member of Screen Actor's Guild Conservatory advisory panel. Koep

has served as Senior Grant Reader for the Jacob Javits Foundation and a final judge/reader for the Sarrett National Playwriting Competition. As a member of AEA and SAG he appeared in over 60 leading and supporting roles including Macbeth, Hotspur in Henry IV, Part I, Harold Hill in The Music Man, Rocky in The Iceman Cometh, and Henry VIII for a public television special. Commercial work includes television for McDonald's, Century Corporation, and voice overs for Nissan Trucks. He has directed too many productions to remember, but does recall directing Shakespeare's King John last March, and even now questions why he accepted that project. In Spring, 1996 Koep produced two new plays at the Odyssey Theatre in Los Angeles, Twist of Eight and And the Angels Sing. Future projects include producing a new play written by nationally recognized film director and actor Don Taylor (Stalag 17, Father of the Bride, etc.) for national tour. He is also considered a world class "stand-up" tuna fisherman and has been known to complain when Marlin spoil the tuna fishing.

Mark Kuntz is currently chair of the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival Region 7, and past president of the Northwest Drama Conference. He earned his M.F.A in directing at the University of Oregon, and is currently teaching acting and directing at Eastern Oregon State College. His long time association with KC/ACTF includes numerous regional productions and the Kennedy Center Medallion. Mark has recently developed a new theatrical form called "Splash," which he presented at ATHE in New York this past summer, and is sharing with regional festivals this year. In Northeast Oregon, Mark has been director/playwright for Livewires, a teen theatre/issues based performance group, and is artistic director for LaGrande Summer Youth Theatre.

Dora Lanier is Guest Artist and Visiting Instructor at the University of Montana in Missoula. Intensive study of Kalarippayattu at the University of Wisconsin-Madison led her to travel to India for a seven-month training period at the C.V.N. Kalari, Trivandrum, where she continued weapons training and began the metal weapons portion of the training. Dora continues her training by expanding into the "healing" portion of the martial art Kalarippayattu.

Eric Lange is in his second year with Theatre UNI; his previous position was a three year assignment as the Technical Director for the theatre department at Vanderbilt University in Nashville. He has experience since 1983 as a designer, technician, consultant and manager for productions in regional, community and educational theaters. Venues include The Alley Theatre in Houston, The Dallas Theatre Center, the Philadelphia Academy of Music and the Tennessee Performing Arts Center. Eric received a M.F.A. degree comes from Temple University.

Donald Lillie has worked as an educator and freelance designer for twenty years and is currently an Assistant Professor of Theatre at Missouri Western State College. He

is listed in "Who's Who in Colleges and Universities."

John Lion is serving his fourth year as Director of the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival and Youth and Family Programs. He attended the University of Chicago, Berkeley, and Stanford University where he is ABD. Lion was the Founder, General Director and Artistic Director of The Magic Theatre in San Francisco from 1967 to 1990. While at the Magic Theatre, Lion directed over 70 of the 200 plays produced. In 1979, he produced Sam Shephard's Buried Child which won the Pulitzer Prize and an Obie Award. He has been involved in theater for more than 23 years. Lion served on the Rockefeller Foundation Playwright's Award Committee from 1983 to 1989 and was the recipient of the Margo Jones Award, "Significant Contributions to the Dramatic Art Through the Production of New Plays" in 1986.

Judi Ann Mason began her professional writing career after winning the first Norman Lear Award for Achievement in Comedy Playwriting as part of the American College Theatre Festival in 1975. That play, Livin'Fat, was subsequently produced by New York's famed Negro Ensemble Company, making her one of the youngest playwrights ever to have a professional Off Broadway production. In 1977, her play, A Star Ain't Nothin' But A Hole In Heaven, won the ACTF's first Lorraine Hansberry Award for the Best Play on the Black Experience. Since then, she has written over 50 plays, including the award-winning Indigo Blues and Donny's House, which she adapted into an Emmynominated television special for CBS. She has written for and/or produced such television shows as the awardwinning I'll Fly Away, American Gothic, Beverly Hills, 90210 and Generations. Her first feature film, Sister Act 2: Back In The Habit, starred Whoopi Goldberg and was produced by Walt Disney Productions. She has also written movies for cable, one of which, Sophie & The Moonhanger, she co-wrote and was recently nominated for the Cable Ace Award for Best Writing in a Movie or Mini-Series. Ms. Mason is the recipient of The Shubert Foundation Award for New American Playwrights and has received fellowships from the Gannett and Knight Ridder Foundations. Recently, she was commissioned by The Ohio State University and later by Florida State University to write plays centering on diversity, which she believes is the next great wave in the new American Theatre. The ACTF is where it all began.

Julie McLaughlin is an Iowa native working as a costume designer and artist. Since 1986 she has designed costumes for over 40 productions at the Old Creamery Theatre Company (the oldest Equity theatre in Iowa). Her designs have also been seen on the stages of the Victoria Theatre Association, the West Nebraska Arts Center's Foothills Theatre, and Theatre UNI. Her interest in costume design and the fibre arts has led her into her current work with handmade paper. With this medium she has discovered the many sculptural (as well as two dimensional) qualities handmade paper offers, especially in the area of mask design. Working from her studio in Dysart, Iowa, she is presently researching the use of fiber reactive dyes in the papermaking

process. Along with her personal artistic projects and freelance costume design, she offers workshops on bookbinding and drop spine portfolio boxes.

Karen Mitchell is the director of UNI Interpreters Theatre and an associate professor of Performance Studies at the University of Northern Iowa. Her research interests include cultural performance, performance and social change, feminism, and popular culture. Currently, she is working with Augusto Boal's improvisational theatre techniques to help women develop strategies for examining and improving their self-esteem.

Betty Monroe is an Assistant Professor/Costume Designer at Wichita State University, where she teaches Costume Design, Costume History and Theatrical Make-up. She has a M.F.A. from Michigan State University, and a B.F.A. from Wayne State University. This past year she presented a paper at the 6th International Congress of European Theatre in Athens, Greece, and received a Summer Research Grant to study 19th century clothing at The Museum of Costume in Bath, England. In 1992 she won the ACTF Meritious Achievement Award for Costume Design for W.S.U.'s production of *Starmites*.

Miriam Must, co-founder Red Eye, the Twin Cities' sole professional experimental theater. In the fouteen seasons since then, she has served as Managing Director and core company member, in which positions she has overseen and executed most of the theatre's adminstrative activies, as well as originated over 25 roles and toured in selected productions to New York, San Francisco, and Los Angeles. She has been a frequent guest speaker on various arts panels and a community faculty member of Metropolitan State University since 1988.

Jason Palmquist is Coordinator of the Programming Group at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, DC. A former Irene Ryan candidate, Mr. Palmquist began his tenure at the Kennedy Center as the American College Theater Festival Intern for the 1994 National Festival. Currently, Mr. Palmquist administers the Classical Ballet and Modern Dance programs at the Kennedy Center whose 1996/97 dance season includes engagements by San Francisco Ballet, Pacific Northwest Ballet, the Merce Cunningham Dance Company, Pilobolus, the Paul Taylor Dance Company, and the Kirov Ballet. Additionally, he serves as a nominator for the Helen Hayes Awards and as a member of the play-reading committee for Theatre Conspiracy, a Washington-based not-for-profit company. Mr. Palmquist is a graduate of the University of Northern Iowa.

Dan Plato, chair of playwriting for Region V of the KC/ACTF, has, over the past eleven years with ACTF, served as vice chair for Louisiana, a member of the selection team and design coordinator for Region VI, an Irene Ryan judge for eleven years, and Vice Chair of playwriting for Region V. His play, *The Medea Myth*, has been performed nationwide

and in Canada, and received a KC/ACTF award for playwriting when it was performed in Region V by the University of Kansas. Plato currently serves as Chair of the Department of Theatre Arts at the University of North Dakota.

Josie Poppens has designed costumes for over thirty productions in her eight years with Drake University. In addition to her design responsibilities, she teaches costuming, costume design, advanced costume technology, and stage makeup. She has free-lanced with the Iowa Shakespeare Project, Ballet Iowa, and has designed and built several mascots for large corporations. She is responsible for the creation of Drake Theatre's web page and has made significant use of the computer as a design and teaching tool.

Kathryn (Katie) D. Robinson, is the past national chair of The Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival, and serves as the director of the School of the Performing Arts at Louisiana Tech University. She is a professional producer, actor, and director in addition to having a career in academic theatre. Her education includes an M.F.A. in Acting/Directing from Southern Illinois University, an Acting Certificate from the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art, and a Ph.D. in Fine Arts from Texas Tech University. In addition to her national chairmanship, Robinson has held numerous positions in KC/ACTF including: Louisiana state chair, chair of Region VI, the National Committee's chair of chairs, national vice chair, and currently is the official KC/ACTF rep to the ATHE board. She has received both the Bronze and Gold Medallions of Excellence from the Kennedy Center. In 1992, she was inducted in the College of Fellows of the Southwest Theatre Association. Other professional activities include offices in the American Theatre Association, the Association for Theatre in Higher Education, Alliance for Arts in Education, the Southwest Theatre Conference, the Southwest Theatre Association, and the Theatres of Louisiana. Her professional activities include directing the Irene Ryan Winners Circle of Scenes at the John F. Kennedy Center of the Performing Arts in Washington, DC in 1991, and serving as a master-of-ceremonies of the event in 1994 and 1995. Serving as artistic producer, she collaborated with actors Anthony Zerbe, Roscoe Lee Brown, Valerie Harper, and Michael Learned in the company, Cameo Theatre, Inc. Her reputation in directing resulted in her serving as guest lecturer for a series on comedy at the Smithsonian Institution. In 1993 she represented the United States at the International Performing Arts Festival in Sitges, Spain.

Amy RohrBerg Wilson - Ms. Wilson's work as a costume designer has included engagements at The Barn Theatre in Augusta, Michigan, Peoria Civic Opera in Illinois and The Old Creamery Theatre in Iowa. She was recognized by the KC/ACTF for excellence in costume design. Her specialties include mask making, Kabuki Theatre and millinery. She received her M.F.A. in Costume/Makeup Design at Michigan State University and is currently an Assistant Professor of Theatre and Costume Studio Technical Director at the

University of Northern Iowa.

Theophil W. Ross, current chair of the Department of Communication and Theatre Arts at Northwest Missouri State University, has been with NWMSU since 1978. His contributions to the program there include development of the departmental Internship Program which places students with summer companies throughout the country, in placing theatre students in instructional activities in other departments, and as co-host of NODAWAY Update at KQTV in St. Joseph, Missouri. Mr. Ross has directed numerous productions at NWMSU, including *Ghosts, The Dining Room, No Exit*, and *Macbeth*, all ACTF entries, and narrated *Children of Krishna*, which was broadcast over 100 Public Radio Stations.

Clyde Ruffin is a professor and former chair of the Department of Theatre at the University of Missouri-Columbia, where he has been on the faculty since 1983. He holds a B.A. in Speech and Dramatic Art and an M.F.A. in Performance from the University of Iowa. He is a member of the African-American Arts Task Force for the Missouri Arts Council and the Art for Life Advisory Board for University Hospitals and Clinics. Professor Ruffin has worked extensively to promote excellence in the arts as a site reporter for the National Endowment for the Arts and regional judge for the American College Theater Festival. Founding director of the University of Missouri's award-winning Black Theatre Workshop, for the past fifteen years Ruffin has designed costumes for the Metro Theatre Company, most recently for the St. Louis Repertory Theatre production of Once On This Island. Professor Ruffin is a Kellogg National Fellow and recipient of the National Leadership Conference Service Award, the Purple Chalk Award for Outstanding Undergraduate Teaching, and the William T. Kemper Fellowship for Excellence in Training. He is the current Vice Chair of Playwriting for Region V of the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival.

Martha Ruskai has been teaching wig and makeup techniques to the performing, design and technical students at North Carolina School of the Arts since 1987. B.F.A. and M.F.A. Wig and Makeup alumni have gone on to work at The Asolo, Goodspeed Opera, Utah Shakespeare Festival, Santa Fe Opera, Arena Stage, Vienna English Theater, Virginia Opera, Playmaker's Repertory Theater, Hartford Stage, and Utah Opera. Included on her list of professional credits as makeup artist, wig maker and designer are the Santa Fe Opera, Cincinnati Opera, Pittsburgh Opera, Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park, Toledo Opera, Nashville Opera, National Opera, New York Concert Baroque/Concert Royal, Atlanta Ballet, Atlanta Opera, North Carolina Dance Theater, Opera Carolina, Greensboro Opera and Piedmont Opera. In addition she built and styled properties wigs for the motion picture Sleeping with the Enemy and for the TNT production of Tecumseh! Paul Sannerud's design credits include over 200 designs created for opera, theatre, television, dance and industrials. Her play, Hybrids and Ploughshares was commissioned by the Henry A. Wallace Foundation and endorsed by the Iowa's sesquicentennial committee. Jeffrey Seller-After appearing in a Purim play in the fourth grade, Jeffrey began a theatrical journey that included acting, directing, writing, selling ads, publicizing, booking shows, and finally, producing. In 1990 Jeffrey met Jonathan Larson, whose rack monologue, tick. tick...BOOM! inspired Jeffrey to produce his work, and Kevin McCollum, with whom he owns The Booking Office, a theatrical booking and producing organization. Both of these gratifying relationships have culminated in the realization of Jeffrey's wildest dreams. Jeffrey grew up in Oak Park, Michigan, is a 1986 graduate of the University of Michigan, and received the 1996 Tony Award for Best Musical for producing Rent.

Tina Shackleford (B.A., University of Tennessee, M.F.A., University of California, San Diego) is the Production Stage Manager for the University of Iowa Performing Arts Production Unit. She also teaches graduate and undergraduate students in the Stage Management and Production areas. Before coming to Iowa, Tina was a freelance A.E.A. stage manager. Her professional credits include

productions with La Jolla Playhouse, Seattle Group Theatre, Actors Theatre of Louisville, Clarence Brown Theatre Company, Dallas Theater Canter, and the Shakespeare Festival of Dallas, as well as collaborations with Theatre de la Jeune Lune and the Latino comedy group Culture Clash.

Casey Stangl is Artistic Director of Eye of the Storm in Minneapolis. She also does freelance directing for theatre and opera companies around the country.

Kate Ufema is currently the Voice & Speech Specialist teaching in the Professional Actor-Training Program of the Department of Theatre at the University of Minnesota at Duluth. Additionally, Kate is an Equity actress and singer, director, musical director, vocal/dialect coach, and voice consultant and trainer. Matthew Vaky has taught with the Guthrie Education department for almost ten years. He taught acting and directing at Carnegie-Mellon University for four years, was the Director of Education at The Children's Theatre of Minneapolis, and currently teaches acting to sign interpreters at the College of St. Catherine.

Naomi Wallace is from Kentucky. Her plays include: *Slaughter City*, which was awarded the 1995 Mobil Prize and received its world premiere in January 1996 at the Royal Shakespeare Company. It was subsequently presented by

the American Repertory Theatre in Cambridge, Mass. One Flew Spare was commissioned and produced in October 1995 by the Bush Theatre in London. It was recently published in American Theatre magazine (March 1995 issue) and was awarded the 1995 Susan Smith Blackburn Prize. In the Fields of Aceldama; The Girl Who Fell Through a Hole in Her Sweater is a children's play co-written with Bruce McLeod and produced by the London New Play Festival. The War Boys was produced at London's Finborough Theatre. Her plays will be published in America by Broadway Play Publishing. Her film, Lawn Dogs, has been directed by John Duigan ("Flirting" "Sirens"), is produced by Duncan Kenworthy ("Four Weddings and a Funeral") and will be distributed by Rank Films in 1997. At present, Wallace is under commission by the Royal Shakespeare Company; BBC Radio; Actors Theatre of Louisville; Wind Dancer Production Group; and the Royal National Theatre/BT Youth Project.

Franklin White became a theatre professional with "Ballet Ramert" when he was fifteen years old. Since then he spent over a quarter of a century as a principal dancer and mime with England's Royal Ballet, performing in most of the major opera houses of the world.
