Deborah is the immediate past Chair of Region IV of the KC/ACTF. While Chair of the region, she also established the 10-minute playwriting contest for student playwrights and student directors. She is also the senior Member-at-Large for KC/ACTF. She most recently published a chapter entitled "Building the Gift: Creating a character in Wasserstein's The Sister's Rosensweig" in the book, <u>Wendy Wasserstein: A Casebook</u>. She is very happy to spend her spare time with her husband, Crosby, and their three children, Lucas, Susan, and lan.

Tracy Armagost, originally from Lincoln, Nebraska, is currently beginning her thirteenth season with the Santa Fe Opera in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Tracy first began as a Properties Carpenter Apprentice and soon joined the staff as a Properties Run Crew Assistant. In the years that followed, she became the Properties Run Crew Chief, worked as the Housing Assistant and is currently the Assistant to the Technical Director. Besides working at the Santa Fe Opera, Tracy has worked with the Theater Residency Project, at risk student theatre group. Tracy also stage manages and designs for the Northern New Mexico Community Theatre and is a Tinwork Artist.

Brenda Bedard-DeVita is the Artistic Coordinator and Casting Director for American Players Theatre. Brenda is a native of lowa, where she attended both lowa State University and the University of Northern lowa. After graduating from the University of Northern lowa, she attended the Professional Theatre Training Program at the University of Delaware. After one year of graduate school Brenda went to Japan to work and study with Tadashi Suzuki in Toga Mura. Then she moved on to work as a professional actress in Milwaukee, Madison, Rockford and Chicago for five years. Her favorite roles include; Stella in *Streetcar Named Desire*, Joanne in *A Few Good Men*, Chloe in *Lips Together Teeth Apart*, Carol in *Oleanna*, and Maggie in *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof*. She has also done a number of commercials and industrials. For the past four seasons she has taken a break from acting to start a family and to work as the Casting Director and Artistic Coordinator at American Players Theatre in Spring Green, WI, where she lives with her husband Jim, son Gale and new daughter Sophia.

Ann Bergeron is a distinguished Professor of Theatre at the University of Minnesota, Duluth where she coordinates the performance programs, teaching courses in jazz and tap dance as well as movement for actors and acting courses. She received her M.F.A. in Dance from the University of California, Irvine and her M.F.A. in Directing from the University of Texas at Austin. She has twice been awarded a Fulbright-Hays Seminar representing American dance and theatre educators in the People's Republic of China and, most recently, in India. Her directing, choreographing, teaching assignments and guest workshops have taken her across the U.S.A. as well as to China, Australia, England, Hungary, India, and Romania. Her most current project is choreographing the music videos for the pop singer, Charity.

James Buglewicz has been a professional director and teaching artist for the past ten years. He holds a B.F.A. from New York University's Experimental Theatre Wing and a M.F.A. from the University of Arizona in directing. He currently is an assistant professor of Theatre and Video at Missouri Western State College in Saint Joseph, Missouri. His most recent productions include *Caucasian Chalk Circle*, *Madwoman of Chaillot*, *The Mikado* and his first feature film, *To Cross A River*.

Robert R. Buseick is chair of Theatre/Speech/Dance at Centenary College, a position he has held since 1969. Professor Buseick holds his M.F.A. in theatre from the University of Portland, studied at the Central School of Speech and Drama, London, England and received his undergraduate work at Eastern Oregon University. With service to KC/ACTF since 1970, he has served KC/ACTF as a Member At Large to the Governing Board, been Region VI Chair and Louisiana Chair. He has served as an Irene Ryan Respondent and has conducted various workshops at regional and state festivals. In recognition of his contribution to KC/ACTF, he was presented with gold and bronze Kennedy Center Medallions. He has been the official timer as well as director of the "Evening of Irene Ryan Scenes" at the National Festival. Several productions under his direction have been selected for presentation at Region VI Festivals, and his production of My Sister In The House was selected to be showcased at the Terrace Theatre in Washington, D.C. Since arriving in Shreveport, he has directed 163 productions, including opera, musicals, outdoor dramas, Shakespeare, comedies, dramas and world premieres of original scripts. During the past year he directed Grand Hotel, Dracula, and The Tempest. This academic year he has directed Coastal Disturbances, Lonely Planet, and a musical revue Tony Tunes: the Best of Broadway. He will direct Peter Pan in April and Nine during the summer of 2000. Mr. Buseick has been honored with a Theatre Fellowship by the Shreveport Regional Arts Council; in 1994, he was named an Honorary Alumnus of Centenary College and, in 1992, he was duly elected a member of the National

Scholarship Fraternity of Alpha Chi. For his contributions to the fine arts, Mr. Buseick was selected by The Shreveport Times as one of the 100 most influential citizens in North Louisiana. In May, he was presented with the "Defender of the Bill of Rights" Award from the Northeast Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union of Louisiana, and the Greater Shreveport Music Teachers Association selected him for their "Cultural Award."

Dennis Chandler is the long time Lighting and Sound Designer at the University of South Dakota. Over the past 30 years he has designed lights or sound for the University of South Dakota, Mankato State University, The University of Nebraska at Lincoln, The Nebraska Rep, The Black Hills Playhouse, The Sioux Falls Playhouse and many others. He has committed his past ten years of research to the integration of digital sound recording, manipulation and playback in theatre, as well as captaining the cause of the Macintosh computer to the masses.

John Cimics teaches acting, directing and voice at St. Cloud State University, and he is artistic director for Theatre L'Homme Dieu. He has performed a Beijing Opera in Beijing, toured a Kabuki production in the South Pacific, danced Viennese waltzes for the White House, sung opera in the Rockies, and done a PBS special in Hawaii.

Clinton Turner Davis has directed productions for the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, Arena Stage, The Juilliard School, Cincinnati Playhouse, Trinity Rep, Milwaukee Rep, Stage West, GeVa, Pearl Theatre, New Repertory Theatre, Theatre Works, Young Playwrights Festival, Negro Ensemble Company, American Place Theatre, WPA and many others. A recipient of NEA/TCG Director and Theatre Fellowships, he has been a consultant to the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games / Cultural Olympiad, National Black Arts Festival, the National Endowment for the Arts, state arts agencies and foundations. A 1997 Pew/TCG National Theatre Residency grant recipient, Mr. Davis is co-founder and board member of the OBIE award winning Non-Traditional Casting Project and serves on the boards of the Society of Stage Directors and Choreographers, its Foundation, the International Theatre Institute's Cultural Identity and Development Committee (ITI-UNESCO), and the New Federal Theatre, where he is also associate producer. A former director-in-residence at New Dramatists, and Distinguished Alumnus of Howard University, Mr. Davis is a professor in the Drama/Dance Department at Colorado College.

Brian Dzwonek is the Education Manager of the Kirby Science Discovery Center at the Sioux Falls Washington Pavilion and has a background in science and education. He has previous experience with the Detroit Science Center, Detroit MI and the Cranbrook Institute of Science, Bloomfield Hills MI. Jay Edelnant is Regents' Professor of Theatre at the University of Northern Iowa in Cedar Falls. Dr. Edelnant received his M.A. and Ph.D. from Northwestern University. While at UNI, he has served as Director of Theatre and Director of Graduate Studies and has received the Regents Award for Faculty Excellence. He has also served as an arts consultant, has been a Sasakawa Fellow at the Japan Studies Institute and has worked as an actor and director in and around the Midwest. A long-time advocate for KC/ACTF, Dr. Edelnant has served as KC/ ACTF's National Chair of Chairs, Member at Large for the National Executive Committee and chair for the National Selection Team for Festival 25. He is currently the National Chair elect.

He opened with the Chicago company of *Miss Saigon* in the role of Chris and played the role on Broadway. He played Enjolras in the national tour of *Les Miserables*. He has many television appearances to his credit including the Aaron Spelling-produced L.A. Firefighters and Pacific Palisades and Andersonville (directed by John Frankenheimer). He has been a company member with the Black Hills Playhouse for many seasons and is a graduate of South Dakota State University.

Beverly Emmons has designed for Broadway, Off-Broadway, Dance, and Opera both in the US and abroad. 


