WORKSHOP DESCRIPTIONS

ACTING AND DIRECTING

Acting for the Camera (Brenda Wentworth and Ron Gregg)

Students will learn techniques for acting on camera. Then they will be videotaped using a digital camera so that they can see themselves on a screen. If they choose, their scenarios may be included in a survey instrument on "Assessing Student Attitudes about Diversity."

Acting Shakespeare (Catherine Weidner)

Shakespeare's plays present particular challenges to the contemporary actor. This workshop will help the actor meet those challenges and make Shakespeare's language come alive, and give actors the opportunity to explore and develop the tools needed to perform texts by Shakespeare and other playwrights of the classical repertory. No preparation or previous experience with Shakespeare is necessary. We will focus on basic text work, covering fundamental skills which will "demystify" the language and give actors a practical, commonsense approach to the text. All participants should bring a pencil or pen. Teachers are welcome.

Auditioning (Shirley Rich)

An audition workshop for students presented by top New York casting director, Shirley Rich. Students should come prepared with an audition monologue and/or scene.

Auditioning for Commercials (James Buglewicz)

Learn and work the technique of auditioning for the camera. Special emphasis on analysis of commercial copy and slating for the camera.

Auditioning in New York: Q & A Session (Shirley Rich)

A question-and-answer session for acting students with top New York casting director, Shirley Rich.

Audition Tips (Eve Himmelheber)

This workshop will cover how to choose effective audition material as well as presentation.

Auditioning with Classical Material: Q & A Session (Ryans Classical Acting Awards team)

Come meet with the Irene Ryan Classical Acting Awards team to hear their insights/thoughts about how to work with classical material.

The Classical Audition (Lisbeth Roman)

When the audition calls for one contemporary and one classic piece, you can usually find the contemporary piece, and its language and vocabulary are familiar to you. Then there is the "dreaded" classic piece! "How can I find a piece that's just right for me? (Can I read, or even skim, all of Shakespeare in a weekend?) How do I work on it to make it truly my own?" Ms. Roman will work with up to six volunteers from the audience who have a prepared classical audition piece to work on (not a sonnet, two minutes maximum). If possible, also bring an unmarked copy of the monologue (legibly handwritten is fine!).

Discovering Ways to Create an Ensemble (Theresa A. Carson)

This workshop will explore ensemble-building techniques through games and exercises focused on the elements of rhythm and movement.

Going Supernova: Psychological Gesture and the Artist (Erin McLaine)

An inspiring and inventive look at how the actor/director/choreographer translates the playwright's language into his/her own. Using Michael Chekhov's technique, the workshop will explore multimedia as stimulus for the artist going into production. Drawing on personal experience with other art forms, the individual will harness, intensify, and focus characterization, character journey, individual technique, and imagination.

The Minority Professional Actor (Darryl Stamp)

Join Darryl, a minority Equity actor, for a discussion and Q & A about preparation to work in the profession, difficulty finding work in large markets, and any other issues you may wish to discuss.

Picturization for the Stage (Lori Horvik)

This participatory workshop will focus on one of the main tools of director communication - the placement of actors on stage. Concepts of composition, spatial awareness, and pictorial arrangement will be the focus of this session.

POOF! (Dr. Gary N. Ellenberger)

A staged reading and discussion of a student original short Children's Theatre play. The original Hannibal-LaGrange College cast of POOF! will present a modified version (i.e., costumes and basic props but no set) of the production as staged in the Orpheum Theatre, Hannibal, Missouri. This will be followed by a Q & A session with the playwright/director, the designers, and the cast and crew. Particular attention will be drawn to the genesis and metamorphosis of the text.

Physical Shakespeare (James Buglewicz)

Explore the Bard's text utilizing Grotowski's physical plastiques. This is a unique and fresh approach to working with language, text, and physicality. Bring a Shakespearian monologue that you are working on and dress in loose comfortable clothes and good shoes...we will be moving!!!!!

Preparing for the Irene Ryan Auditions (Beate Pettigrew)

Is there a formula? How can you prepare effectively? Come with your questions about the Irene Ryan Acting Scholarship Auditions.

The Cooperative Method of Directing: A Knowledge- to Commitment-Based Approach (Steve Thorson) An exploration of script, character, and performer.

ADMINISTRATIVE AND TEACHING

ACTF: History and Reminiscences

The Distinguished KC/ACTF Alumni Committee invites you for a Q & A to reminisce about the history of the American College Theater Festival.

Designers' Breakfast Forum (John Hill)

Join your design faculty colleagues for some early morning socializing in the hotel dining room. Open discussion about teaching strategies, expectations, and standards for design students, integrating technologies, you name it.

<u>Directors' Breakfast Forum</u> (Tom Woldt)

Meet with your directing colleagues in the hotel dining room for some coffee, breakfast, and talk. Open discussion about teaching strategies, setting standards for your actors, selecting repertory, and whatever else strikes your early morning fancy!

<u>Issues in Teaching</u> (David McTier)

A forum to identify and discuss problems and issues facing theatre educators at the college/university level: assessment, accreditation, pedagogy, and teaching methods; paradigm shifts (learning vs. teaching), technology, and online opportunities.

Lions, Tigers & Grad School...Oh My! (Craig A. Ellingson and David Wintersteen)

MA? MFA? PhD? Come and we will talk about differences between MA, PhD, and MFA programs, big and small schools, and school location as factors in choosing a program. Interested undergrads can get assistance in deciding if grad school is right for them, finding and evaluating grad programs, how to apply successfully, and how to survive that first semester in grad school.

Planning Your First Web Page (Arden Weaver)

Introduction to Web Page Design, structure, audience, and tools.

Producing Theatre at Church-Affiliated Colleges: Issues, Problems, and Rewards (David Wintersteen) An open forum for faculty and students to discuss the challenges of maintaining a healthy relationship between a co-curricular theatre program in a church-related institution. All perspectives are welcome: faculty and students from public and private schools of any (or no) religious tradition.

Promoting and Recruiting with Technology (Dennis I. Johnson)

Learn how to create a résumé CD-rom or a departmental recruitment CD-rom.

Region V Festival Critique (Harry Parker)

Ioin Region V Chair Harry Parker in an open roundtable about this year's Festival.

Teacher Workshop! (Jack Parkhurst)

Bring questions and concerns and let's talk. Jack has several years of successful teaching in high school prior to moving to the university level. "So why did he leave?" Come and find out!

"Town Hall Meeting" - A Place at the Season Selection Table: Success Stories and Challenges in Producing Work by Playwrights of Color

An open discussion of strategies, philosophies, and solutions for the inclusion of work by African-American, Hispanic-American, and Asian-American dramatists in college and university seasons. How do we produce the work if we have no faculty of color? Or one faculty member of color with a significant overload? Can we mount the work without actors of color? How do we serve our students of color by producing work that celebrates their ethnic heritage? Participants will be asked to share success stories, discuss challenges on their home campuses, and brainstorm on the ways and means of effective inclusion of these important works of the theatrical canon in our seasons. There will be discussion of proven resources and resource people, consultants, an opportunity to share sample curricula/syllabi, and recommended guest artists for including diversity issues in classes, production, and training. The results of these discussions will be reported at the ATHE & BTN and included on a Kennedy Center Web page devoted to diversity issues as a resource to the profession. This "Town Hall Meeting" will be jointly hosted by representatives of the Black Theatre Network, ATHE, and the KC/ACTF Executive Committees.

Using PowerPoint and Online Resources to Enhance Instruction and Rehearsals (David McTier) A demonstration of how PowerPoint and online resources have been used to enhance content-based theatre classes as well as the rehearsal process.

Workshop For KC/ACTF Respondents (Harry Parker)

Learn the ins and outs of responding to regional productions for KC/ACTF. Region V Chair Harry Parker shares insights and proven ideas for faculty who want to practice responding, or who are simply interested in the process of production responses for the Festival. Open to anyone interested.

COSTUME AND MAKEUP

Designing Costumes for Dance (Linda Pisano)

This workshop provides an introduction to designing costumes for dance. It will include ballet, modern, academic, and professional. There will be discussion about creative solutions, conceptual designing, and ideas on how to collaborate with choreographers.

Makeup Special Effects (Gene Flaharty) This presentation addresses potential problems encountered during the application of performance and disguise makeup. Highlights, shadows, 3-D makeup, blood, and other effects will be demonstrated and discussed. Specific products designed to prevent or resolve many common consumer problems will be demonstrated, making the application of special effects makeup safe, easy, and fun!

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Watercolors and Mixed Media for Costumes and Scenery (Nancy Pontius and Susan Mai)

Demonstration and hands-on. Watercolor and mixed media techniques for scenic and costume sketches. "Things you were told not to do in kindergarten which we will do as adults." Limited to fifteen participants.

DESIGN AND TECHNICAL THEATRE

After Preview: Opening Night Was Put Off!! (Beverly Emmons)

Our guest lighting respondent this year will again be Beverly Emmons, a lighting designer in New York. Following the presentation of the Thayer workshop, Beverly will conduct a workshop incorporating one of the designs from the Thayer Competition. One student designer will be selected (you will be given a chance to volunteer) and given the opportunity to redo the design, with our audience watching. This will be that special moment that the audience never sees. Opening night has, for some reason, been put off. What changes would you like to make: move a fixture, change a color filter, redo some cues, change some timing, whatever? This should be a great opportunity. Beverly's workshop will begin at 6:30 p.m. in the Black Box Theatre. This should allow everyone to get to the 8 p.m. performance, but if something exciting is happening, we will keep going. We expect this to be a relaxed affair.

Automated Pans and Fades and Cues, Oh My! (Mark Putman)

Using Richmond Sound Design's "Audio Box" to automate pans, surround sound, and more.

Behind the Scenes Look at the Santa Fe Opera and Employment Opportunities (Tracy Armagost)

An overview of the Santa Fe Opera and employment opportunities.

A Delicate Balance: The E-mail Diaries (Alison Ford)

An informal reading and slide show (archived Web images) of design collaboration e-mail for the Iowa Summer Repertory Theatre. A brief Q & A to follow.

<u>Design in a Global Marketplace...Breaking the Language Barrier</u> (Donald Lillie)

A description and a reflection and discussion of my recent work in Hong Kong, China, and what it is like designing in a foreign country.

Regional Designers' Roundtable (Jim Lane)

An informal roundtable discussion on design topics that affect our region and its students. Agenda items range from teaching strategies and student preparedness to our current festival policies. Got an agenda item? Bring it to the table!

Starting a Student USITT Chapter (Patricia Dennis)

This is an information session about the process of beginning a USITT Student Chapter and keeping it active.

Summer Opera Q & A (Tracy Armagost and Brian Swanson)

A workshop designed to answer questions about summer stock (with a specific focus on summer opera) for students, focusing on two different spectrums with a smaller opera company, Aspen Opera, and a much larger one, Santa Fe Opera.

Ten-Minute Design Workshop (Jim Lane)

Mentored workshop in which participants design scenery, lights, and costumes for the student original tenminute plays.

IMPROVISATION AND THEATRE GAMES

Building an Ensemble (Joe Price)

The workshop will focus on building a strong ensemble through the use of theatre games and improvisation.

Facing Your Oppressor: The Theatre Games and Techniques of Augusto Boal (Dr. Pamela D. Chabora) This active workshop will explore the games and theatre techniques of Augusto Boal. Famous for his use of theatre for socio-political purposes, Boal has developed progressive improvs and exercises to examine the intricacies of human interaction.

Spontaneity! (Craig Ellingson and Theresa Carson)

An introductory workshop on improvisation. Main areas of focus will be observation, physicality, and bold choices. Participants should come ready and willing to explore.

Starting Your Own Improv Troupe (Jay S. Rozema and Jason Daunter)

Learn how to create your own improv troupe in order to enhance character development.

The Rubber Chicken Factory (Mark Frank)

Learn how to incorporate improv and performance games into rehearsal. Also learn how to put together a comedy sketch.

MOVEMENT AND VOICE

Effort in Acting (Theresa Mitchell)

This participatory workshop will explore Laban's Efforts (weight, time, and space) and the applications to acting.

Movement Thru Mayhem (Scott Stackhouse)

Take a risk! Open up the physicality through commitment to lunacy! Discover the physical side of acting with extremely physical improvisational movement and games.

The Music of the Consonants (Lisbeth Roman)

Staccato drum taps, whispering sibilance, sustained tones of strings, woodwinds, and brass - consonants bring music to the speaking voice. The rhythms of a language greatly define its specific character - clicks to slides to growls to purrs - all are part of the music of the consonants. The consonant sounds of United States English will be "tasted" as individual orchestral instruments and explored as aids in providing not just intelligibility but meaning, emotion, and subtext.

No, Really, Breathe All You Like (Scott Stackhouse)

Strengthen the connection between breath and voice through relaxation and improvisation.

Oh, What Are You Supposed to Be...British? (Scott Stackhouse)

Nail down a British accent via specific sound changes, scene work, and improvisation.

MUSICAL THEATRE AND DANCE

Musical Theatre Audition Technique - Opening Session (Kip Niven)

Learn about the perils, the frustrations, and - believe it or not! - the joys of auditioning for a role in a musical. The material covered will be based on Mr. Niven's nearly thirty years of experience in professional theatre, and especially his studies and friendship with the late David Craig, author of On Singing Onstage and A Performer Prepares. Learn the theory and principles of Mr. Craig's techniques as well as many audition "dos and don'ts." Student participants should come prepared "to audition" with sixteen bars of an audition song of their choice (up-tempo or ballad). Observers are welcome.

Peter Altman is in his first season as leader of Missouri Repertory Theatre. He has taught for over twenty-five years at the University of Minnesota and Boston University. He is a graduate of the University of California at Berkeley and the University of Pennsylvania, and also studied at Harvard University, the University of Urbino, Italy, and in Germany. Mr. Altman's honors include National Endowment for the Arts and Bush Foundation fellowships, and the Elliot Norton Award for Outstanding Contribution to Professional Theatre in Boston.

Jack Parkhurst is presently an Associate Professor at Nebraska Wesleyan University. Although he has taught at the university level for the past thirteen years, he first taught at the secondary level for a number of years. He taught in a small Iowa high school and a large Nebraska school. He was awarded the John Barner Award for the most exemplary program in the country as well as being invited to perform five times in ten years at the Educational Theatre Association's summer conference on the Main Stage. Jack is an Associate member of the Society of Stage Directors and Choreographers and regularly directs professionally.

Beate Pettigrew is the new KC/ACTF Region V Vice-Chair. She is this year's workshop coordinator and has loved traveling the interstate highways on weekends responding to academic productions. Originally an Air Force brat, Beate has traveled extensively but considers the Midwest "home." She has BSE and BFA degrees from Emporia State University and an MA from the University of Kansas. After graduating magna cum laude as a Hallmark Fellow from the University of Missouri - Kansas City with an MFA in stage directing, Beate has taught theatre and speech communication at the University of Missouri - Kansas City, Longview Community College, Emporia State University, and Johnson County Community College. Sheilah Philip-Bradfield is the Festival Coordinator and Chair of the Department of Theatre at Johnson County Community College. She has BA and MS degrees in Speech/Theatre from Fort Hays State University and earned an MFA in stage directing from the University of Missouri - Kansas City in 1983. After teaching and directing for five years at Colby Community College in western Kansas, she returned in 1989 to the Kansas City area. ACTS and OINCS... (Bob Willenbrink)

A discussion of theatre techniques with disabled citizens and alternative careers for theatre artists.

Beyond the University (Megan Monoghan)

The Playwrights' Center, in Minneapolis, is a nationally recognized playwrights' service organization and a great source of support for writers both in and out of university settings. During this session, Megan will give an overview of the resources and opportunities the Center offers to its members and detail the value of student membership in the Center. She will answer questions about The Playwrights' Center's programs providing long-distance dramaturgy, reading and internship opportunities, grant and festival applications, classes and workshops, and the Center's newly built black box theater space and the new plays which will fill it. This session is intended for faculty members and students alike.

The Business of Theatre (Dennis Porter)

We will look at the off-off-stage workings of theater. First, we will determine the differences between producing and presenting (or promoting) a show. Then we'll take a deeper look at the business aspects of both, including contracts, box office, settlements, marketing, advertising and company management. This will be an informal workshop, and questions and discussion are encouraged.

The History of the William Inge Festival (David Sherlock)

Join David Sherlock, the Technical Director of the Inge Festival, for a Q & A on how and why the Inge Festival began and what its goals are in the future.

An Introduction to Lightwave 6.0: Basic Uses of 3D Software in Design (Patrick Immel)

This workshop will cover basic modeling, rendering and lighting techniques as applied through Lightwave 6.0.

Wig Basics (Jan Delovage)

This workshop will address a number of concerns about wigging in a production, including who needs one, what to use and where to find it, basic styling and tools, how to put it on so it stays on (and looks good), and care and maintenance of wigs and hairpieces.

ZOIKS! (ESU students)

Is a student run improv and sketch comedy troupe based at Emporia State University. Currently in its eighth year, Zoiks! performs for campus groups, the Emporia community and for organizations all over the state of Kansas. Zoiks! enjoys long walks on the beach, moonlight serenades, and performing improvisational comedy at Region V KC/ACTF. Look for Zoiks! during the late night student party events.

Jan Delovage has an MA in Theatre from the University of North Dakota and an MFA in Theatre Design from the University of Missouri - Kansas City. She has over 20 years' professional experience in theatrical make-up and wigs, including productions for many regional opera companies, repertory theatres, musical and summer theatre groups, and countless academic productions in both the U.S. and Canada.

Patrick Immel is currently serving as Technical Director and Performance Facility Manager at NW Missouri State University in Maryville. He received his MFA in 1997 from Southern Illinois University at Carbondale with an emphasis in Lighting Design. Recent designs include lighting for Dangerous Liaisons, scenic for Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead, and technical direction for Guys and Dolls.

Dennis Porter has a degree in Theater Business from William Jewell College. He has produced theater in churches, at a local amusement park and professionally. Dennis has been involved in presenting national Broadway tours and regional tours of Broadway musicals. You can also find Dennis clowning around as a local entertainer.

David Sherlock is in his eighth year at Independence Community College and is the Fine Arts Division Chair as well as a communications and theatre instructor. He has designed and directed over thirty productions in schools, colleges, and community theatres in Oregon, Missouri and Kansas. He is the Technical Director for the annual William Inge Theatre Festival and also directs the ICC Summer Dinner Theatre.

Bob Willenbrink is the Chair Region VI and is Director of Theatre at the University of Central Arkansas. During his career he has directed over 75 productions of various styles for many organizations. He is the founder and producer of the Youth Theatre of Central Arkansas and his plays for young audiences have been produced throughout the region.
