REGION 5 FESTIVAL NPP HIGHLIGHTS & YEAR IN RETROSPECT

Process – Ten-Minute Play & One-Act Play Festival; David Mark Cohen Award, Alternative Forms Writing Workshop

A "Call for Scripts" for for our Ten-Minute Play Festival and our One-Act Play Festival went out in August of 2008 and a reminder in Fall of 2008. This was sent out via our KCACTF Region V Listserv and was published on our Region V Website.

The regional deadline for all original scripts (ten-minute, one-act, and full-length associate/participating production scripts) was Monday, October 27. The scripts were then sent in hard & electronic copy to Region VIII for the November 1st deadline Regional Exchange Deadline, with a reading team led by the Region VIII Playwriting Chair, Char Nelson. The scripts were ranked by the Region VIII reading team by Monday, November 27, and the same was true of our team. We will be moving to ALL electronic copy in 2010.

This year we received a total of 83 (up from 65) ten-minute plays and 34 (up from 27) one-acts for a total of 117 scripts for our short play festivals. This represented a slight increase in scripts in both the one-act and ten-minute play categories. These, along with our 19 (down from 20) David Mark Cohen scripts (which represented an increase in produced full-length original scripts in our region) were subsequently blinded and sent via electronic submission and hard copy to Char Nelson, NPP Chair of Region VI who then distributed them to her own script selection committee to determine our top tenminute plays for the Ten-Minute Play Festival, one-act plays for the John Cauble One-Act Plays, and David Mark Cohen scripts. The Ten-Minute Plays were then sent to directors by Buzz Herman, Region V NPP Vice-Chair who then coordinated the Ten-Minute Play Festival and did an enormously successful job, coordinating the auditions, rehearsals, and performances at Festival. We had auditions at Festival shortly after the Ryan Semis-were announced with over 120 actors auditioning in 3 hours. We worked with 6 faculty mentors assigned each to a playwright/director/mentor teams. Each play rehearsed one hour per day for three days of the Festival for a total of 3 hours. Also this year a sound designer was added to the ten-minute play festival and the results were excellent. We changed the time of the ten-minute play Festival to Friday afternoon, which with the new scheduling of our Festival, really helped our audience attendance which was just outstanding.

The One-Act Plays were produced as concert readings by the schools affiliated with the playwrights. Each playwright/director team had a brief amount of time before their performance to rehearse. We changed the time of the one-act play Festival to Thursday evening, which, with the new scheduling of our Festival, really helped our audience attendance, which was just outstanding. We were particularly thrilled to be able to use the Lied Center on the KU Campus, and our One-Act Play Festival was really a tremendous success.

ORIGINAL PLAY PRODUCTIONS – ASSOCIATE AND PARTICIPATING ENTRIES

There was a total of 171 Associate and 42 Participating productions. Of these, we had a total of 26 original productions this year (16 associate, 10 participating), and we invited two original play productions to the Region V Festival this year. These included *Terror Texts; Hair-Raising Tales From Ancient Israel*, written and directed by Jeff Barker, Northwestern College, Orange City, Iowa and *An Old Album* by Richard Paul Klein, University of Minnesota Moorehead.
